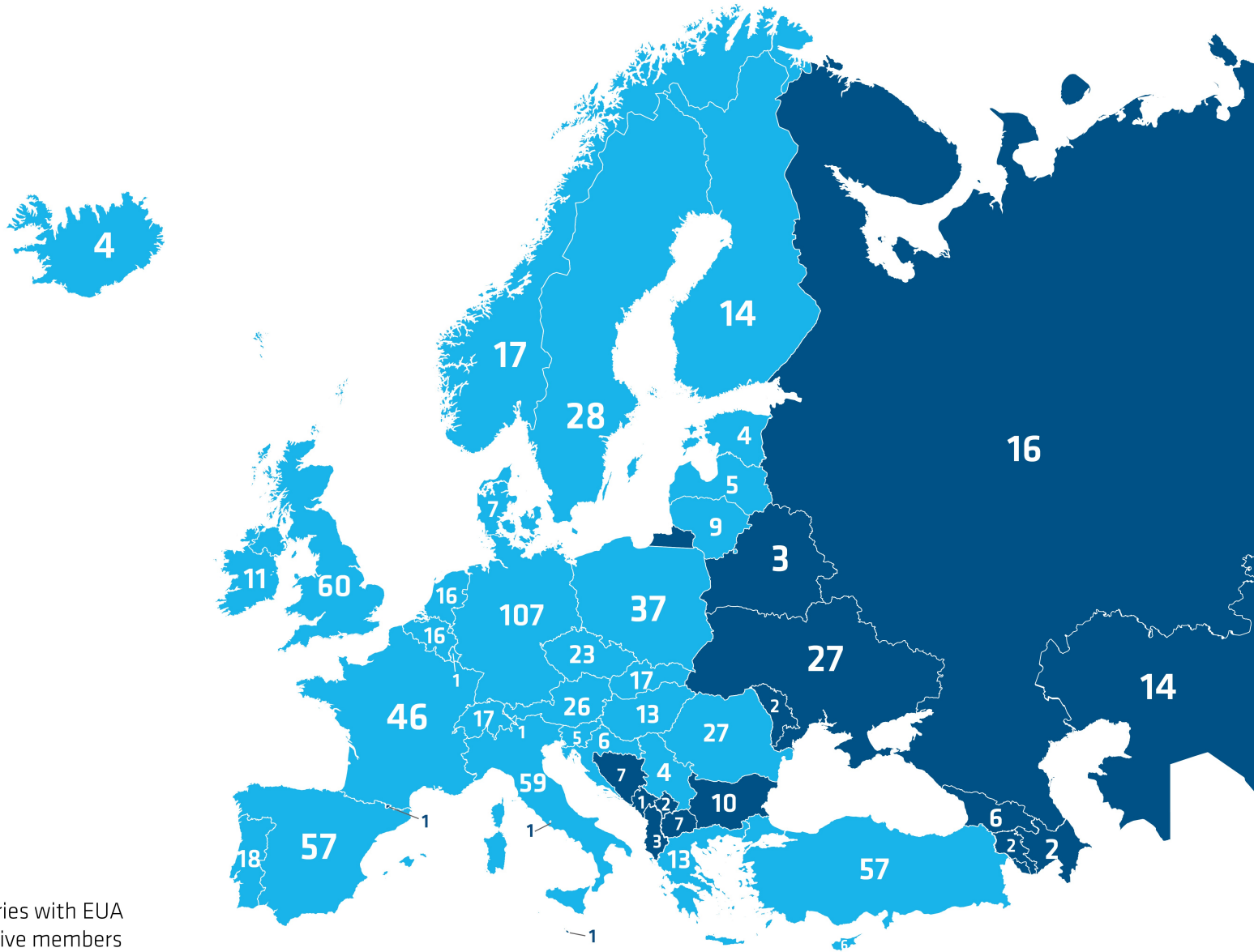
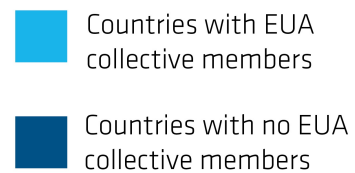

Institutional approaches for (digital) learning



- European University Association (EUA)
- Dublin City University, Ireland (DCU)
- Baden-Württemberg Cooperative State University, Germany (DHBW)
- Vytautas Magnus University, Lithuania (VMU)
- University of Jyväskylä, Finland (JYU)

- Survey to institutional leadership
- Data collection: April to June 2020
- Pre-crisis situation - Covid-19 questions
- 368 responses – mainly universities
- 48 countries
- Longitudinal data (2014 report)

2020 (pre-crisis) compared to 2014

1. Digital L&T has become more strategic & also more mainstreamed, with scope for enhancement

No major change in the number of institutions providing blended and online learning

- Blended learning (75% - in some countries higher)
- Online degree courses (36% - in some countries higher)
- MOOCs (36%)
- Every second institution provides short, non-degree courses (most frequent type of online provision)

More strategic and mainstreamed

- used across the institution (57% - in Northern Europe: 84%)
- Institutional strategies: 88% (2014: 63%)
- Digital learning as a strategic priority: 77%
- Trend towards institution-wide support & coordination structures

2. Shift from experimentation to established purposes

Digital supports internationalisation	Past 5 years	Next 5 years

- Peer learning

Covid crisis – immediate & long-term impact

Immediate:

- pre-existing strategies, structures & capacities
- joining the dots & innovation
- Reflection on L&T - but also generally role of the university
 - learning - social experience
 - University - contribution to society
 - higher education - public responsibility
- resilience strategies

Post crisis:

- Prospects to retain some of the changes?
- more comprehensive approaches (hybrid, hi-flex)
- digital fatigue
- risk of financial cuts – despite capacity needs
